# What is a lightning talk?

According to Wikipedia, a lightning talk is a "very short presentation lasting only a few minutes, given at a conference or similar forum. Several lightning talks will usually be delivered by different speakers in a single session, sometimes called a data blitz."

PechaKucha and Ignite are trademarked formats of lightning talks involving a specific number of slides that are automatically advanced at fixed intervals.

At this symposium, talks are capped at five minutes plus three minutes for questions. The number of slides is limited to ten per presentation.

The lightning talk presenters will be selected based on an equal distribution of topics between philosophy and psychology. Selected presenters will be notified as soon as the registration period has ended.
